Blessings All:

Friday, Nov. 18, 2005 the United States House of Representatives passed the House Budget Reconciliation bill by a vote of 217 to 25. It proposes a national budget that will cut \$50 Billion from some of our most vital antipoverty programs. The Bill, if enacted, will immediately harm the most vulnerable in our land. I called Curtis Ramsey Lucas in National Ministries Office of Governmental Relations in Washington, DC. He forwarded the following information to me. As ministers and disciples of the Risen Savior, we are called to be advocates for biblical justice -- to assure that everything possible is put in place so that the hungry are fed, the naked are clothed, and that children are protected and given the best that our great land can provide. Urge your classmates, church members and neighbors to contact their representatives to voice their concerns about the proposed cuts. Feel free to contact Curt at the email shown if you need more specific information about this bill or if you want to talk with him about the proposed national budget.

Among the top priorities for Congress, when its members return to Washington this week, is the construction of a conference report for spending cuts that is acceptable to both chambers. The House and Senate versions of the reconciliation bill for entitlement spending contain significant differences, particularly with respect to cuts to Medicaid, student loans, and food stamps. The razor-thin margin by which these bills passed in each chamber will likely make reaching consensus during the conference difficult.

The House passed its version of the bill cutting just under \$50 billion on Nov. 18 by only two votes (217-215). With the resignation of Rep. Randy Cunningham (R-CA) on Nov. 28 that margin is cut in half. The Senate had already passed its bill cutting \$39.1 million from entitlement programs over a five-year period on Nov. 3 by a vote of 52 to 47.

The Senate cuts are not nearly as contentious or damaging to low-income beneficiaries as those in the bill passed by the House. To what extent

Senate provisions will be reflected in the final bill is difficult to speculate. The select few Representatives and Senators chosen as conferees will wield considerable power and the bill emerging from conference for a final vote in each chamber could be drastically different than either version.

At its November meeting in Green Lake, WI, the General Board of the American Baptist Churches USA adopted a Declaration on an Issue of Importance on our National Budget (0053.40:11/05). The declaration states, in part, that the budget cuts proposed in the House bill would "harm the most vulnerable in our land and thus further imperil the well-being of all U.S. citizens." It further calls upon "our Office of Governmental Relations, our churches and members to advocate for the poorest among us by calling upon our legislators to refuse passage of any budget bill that eviscerates vital programs that ensure basic human needs and to work to restore necessary funding to anti-poverty programs so that all people in our nation might experience the wholeness and shalom God intends for us."

Tell the House of Representatives: Help the Needy, Not the Greedy!

Protestants for the Common Good sent us the following information and request for action.

After voting to cut \$50 billion from health care, food stamps, child support enforcement, student loans, and other vital services under the guise of deficit reduction, the House is expected to vote on this week on a tax cut bill **which will primarily benefit the very wealthy and increase the deficit.**

The House tax cut reconciliation bill would cost over \$56 billion—using up all of the savings squeezed from services for poor and struggling families, and then some—and the tax cuts are likely to get even larger when the differences are worked out with a very dissimilar Senate bill. For example, the House bill includes an extension of tax breaks for capital gains and dividends—a controversial tax cut which overwhelmingly benefits households with incomes over \$1 million – that was dropped from the Senate bill.

The House had been expected to vote on the tax cut bill before Thanksgiving. But many members were—and are—nervous about voting to give more tax breaks to the very wealthy soon after voting for a bill that would "cut people off food stamps, squeeze student lenders, impose new fees on Medicaid recipients and slash federal aid for child-support enforcement," according to the Washington Post. This vote could be close!

Response to ABCW Name Change

Attached to this edition of *eWind* is a copy of the letter that Larry Greenfield wrote to ABCMC leaders concerning the name change that was reported in last week's *eWind*. The American Baptist Churches of the West announced that the region was changing its name to "Growing Healthy Churches."

International Ministries Makes Prayer Call

International Ministries has asked congregations in ABCUSA to pray for an end to the continued violence, human rights abuse and even murder of innocent persons in the Philippines. This violence has been and is being actively resisted by our Baptist partners and other Christians in that country.

On Nov. 21, the Asian Human Rights Commission issued a report claiming the military had killed nine peasant farmers and injured many others at a vigil held for farm land reform.

Rev. Job Santiago, general secretary of the Convention of Philippine Baptist Churches told IM, "The churches here are raising their voices to the leaders of the country to stop the killings, human rights violations, to care of the environment, to propagate and work for the kind of peace – shalom – that the Lord Jesus showed and gave us." Santiago said not only peasant farmers, but journalists and even ministers have been killed.

During a fact-finding tour in July 2005, Western and Filipino church leaders issued a statement that said over 400 innocent persons had been killed since President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo had taken office in 2001.

Santiago has asked his "brothers and sisters in the ABC" for their assistance. "We really need your prayers and solidarity support," he said.

In response, IM's Rev. Benjamin Chan said "People in the Philippines have been fighting a very difficult, but courageous battle to reclaim their basic rights, and a fair distribution of wealth. Our hearts go out to the innocent victims and their families." Chan, who is IM's area director for East Asia, and responsible for the ministry partnerships in the Philippines, added, "We stand with church leaders who are risking their lives for justice and the foundation of lasting peace."

Two missionaries from IM serve in the Philippines as seminary professors.

Hostages in Iraq

Faithful America provided the following information and request for action.

Four members of the Christian Peacemaker Team (CPT) in Baghdad were kidnapped last Sunday and are held hostage in Iraq. The kidnappers have threatened to kill the peace activists

by Thursday, unless all prisoners in US and Iraqi detention centers are released. These four are in addition to others also taken hostage.

CPT is an ecumenical peacemaking agency associated with the Church of the Brethren, Mennonites and Quakers. Its members are deeply committed to non-violent peacemaking and are willing to put their lives on the line to make it happen.

We are asking that you help in two vital ways:

- 1) GO HERE [letter](#) and add your signature to a letter already signed by several prominent religious leaders calling for the hostages' release. This letter, along with the names of all its signatories, will be forwarded to Al Jazeera, the Middle East's leading news organization. It is believed that it is the best vehicle for reaching the captors and helping to exert influence to win their release.

Petition:

To those who are holding the Christian Peacemakers Team in Iraq, and to people everywhere of all Traditions of Faith and Peace:

We who write you affirm what all the traditions teach that trace their spiritual origin to Abraham: Judaism, Christianity, and Islam all teach explicitly that to kill even one human being - even more strongly one who is doing no harm, most especially one who is seeking peace and nurturing human bodies and communities -- is to destroy a world. All other religious traditions agree about the holiness of human lives.

This teaching applies to all innocent Iraqis and foreigners who have been killed or taken away in Iraq out of anger against the US occupation - and it applies with special clarity and strength to the members of the Christian Peacemakers Team who are being held in Iraq. Like us, they too opposed the US attack. They came to serve the Iraqi people. They came not only to urge peace but also to live peace.

We who have opposed the US invasion and occupation of Iraq call on all who live in Iraq to seek the release of these people into safety and freedom. And we call on all people of good will everywhere to join in this call.

No doubt, those who planned and executed the US invasion and occupation of Iraq will cite this action as evidence for the rightness of their action. We utterly reject this logic, and affirm that the war undertaken by the US has multiplied the violence it pretended to oppose.

We hold morally responsible for the lives of these Christian Peacemakers both those in Iraq who have taken them, and those who have brought about the deaths of thousands of Iraqis and Americans by pursuing this war.

Once again, we call for a swift end to the US occupation of Iraq and for peaceful action by the entire human community to assist Iraqis to achieve their own self-government. And we send our >loving prayers to those who have become victims of their own loving commitment to peace, justice, and healing.

Retired Ministers and Missionaries Offering 2005



The Retired Ministers and Missionaries Offering (RMMO) is promoted and received in American Baptist congregations during November and December each year. Prayerfully decide how you can support the vital ministries supported by this offering. Please give when your congregation receives the offering. Since 1935, American Baptists have contributed to special offerings received in their churches for retired ABC ministers and missionaries, or their widowed spouses. The Retired Ministers and Missionaries Offering (RMMO) was established in 1977.

Through this annual offering, American Baptist congregations say **thank you** in a tangible way to the denomination's retired ministers and missionaries or their widowed spouses.

The offering provides them with:

- Emergency and other financial assistance, based on financial need.
- Thank You checks, based on 15 or more years of ABC service.

Receipts from the 2004 RMMO totaled \$1,764,749, a 1.1% increase over the 2003 receipts of \$1,744,801. Of this amount, \$774,564 was made available to meet immediate emergency and special financial needs. The balance of the receipts was distributed by The Ministers and Missionaries Benefit Board (MMBB) on behalf of American Baptists in the form of Thank You checks: 3,252 checks were distributed in 2004, ranging from \$53.50 to \$428. The average check was \$304.49.

Dallas West, Former Executive Minister, Dies

VALLEY FORGE, PA (ABNS)—The Rev. Dr. Dallas J. West, executive minister of the Indiana Baptist Convention for 30 years, died Dec. 1. He was 86.

West was named executive minister for the Indiana Baptist Convention (now American Baptist Churches of Indiana and Kentucky) in 1955. He directed all missional, administrative, pastoral and financial ministries that served the region's 400 churches. He also was director of World Mission Support for the region.

West was a member of numerous American national organizations, including the General Staff Council, and was on the board of the Edna Martin Christian Center in Indianapolis. He also was active in American Baptist Campus Ministries at several Indiana colleges.

Prior to his regional and national leadership, West held pastorates in Gosport, Shelbyville and Evansville, Ind.

He was a worldwide traveler and participated in mission tours in Europe, Asia and Africa.

A funeral service was held at First Baptist Church in Indianapolis.

"Dallas West was a model of dedication on so many levels of American Baptist life," said the Rev. Dr. A. Roy Medley, General Secretary of American Baptist Churches USA. "His support and nurturing of hundreds of congregations in Indiana over 30 years enabled those churches to provide a powerful witness for Jesus Christ. He also was a valued and cherished colleague for national American Baptist leaders, and brought to all he did wisdom, compassion and a deep commitment to American Baptist ministry."

Understanding the Bible

Lilly Endowment National Clergy Renewal Program

Lilly Endowment Inc. has announced that its popular National Clergy Renewal Program will continue for a seventh year. The Indianapolis-based Endowment offers grants of up to \$45,000 to congregations across the country to allow their pastors to spend some time away from the daily demands of parish ministry. "Pastors and congregations both benefit from this period of renewal," said Craig Dykstra, Endowment senior vice president for religion. "The pastors are given a rare opportunity to dig deep into what 'makes their hearts sing.' The renewal and refreshment of a pastor's heart is key to the spiritual vitality of a congregation's life. That is why we suggest that, before they move too quickly to figure out the details of their renewal proposal, pastors reflect carefully about what kinds of experiences will touch them most deeply."

Most pastors who receive the grant end up spending three to four months away from their churches. Their experiences both open their minds to new possibilities and connect them more deeply with what really matters to them. They travel the world, study things they really care about, and reconnect with family and friends from years past.

"As they explore the roots of their religious traditions, write poetry, practice contemplative prayer, and spend weeks or months in significantly different cultural contexts," Dykstra said, "they come to see their ministries with fresh eyes. At the same time, the congregations often come to see their pastors and themselves in a new way as well. The planning process itself gives them a better understanding of what their pastors do, and their appreciation for them grows. Sometimes congregations decide to undertake a spiritual journey of their own alongside the pastor; they may read some of the same books the pastor is reading or form discussion groups around the sabbatical theme. Comments from former recipients prove to us that both pastors and congregations find the whole experience empowering and exciting."

As many as 120 congregations will be selected for the 2006 program. They will join the more than 600 that have received grants since 2000. While each grant proposal may request up to \$45,000, up to \$15,000 of that may be used for congregational activities during the pastor's absence.

Completing the application requires a joint effort of the pastor and congregation; applicants are encouraged not to put off applying until the last minute. "The process takes some time," cautions Dykstra. "It involves intentional and purposeful discussion between the congregation and the pastor. It is not just a form that can be filled out overnight. We have found, however, that - even among congregations that did not receive grants - the application process itself helped them focus on issues such as effective leadership, the future directions of the congregation, and the like."

Also on the Endowment's Web site are two documents that applicants may find helpful: "What Makes a High-Quality Proposal?" and "Grace Notes." Both the brochure and the Web site also

suggest possible reading materials for interested persons. To be eligible, ministers must have earned at least a master of divinity degree. The program is open to all Christian congregations in 49 states and the District of Columbia. The deadline for proposals is May 15, 2006.
